Adults Independent and Motivated (AIM)

is a new community of adults with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities who live in an apartment setting. Participants have active lives, engaging in vocational, social, educational, and recreational activities. Families are an integral part of AIM, remaining active in the life of their participant and in the AIM community.

Independence. Participants—who function relatively independently but require some support—live in an apartment complex at the Galleria in Bee Cave. They can independently walk to Whole Foods, the library, a movie theater, and dozens more stores and restaurants.

•Community. Because their friends with disabilities are their neighbors, participants can spontaneously enjoy typical social activities— hanging out at the pool, playing games at one another's apartments, getting lunch at Panera— without needing a third party to drive or coordinate.

■ Appropriate support. Families remain active in their participants' lives, and AIM offers support, such as a 24/7 helpline, and fosters a sense of community through shared activities. Through fundraising, we plan to offer transportation to and from work.


Cost: Our program does not charge a fee. Participants incur the regular costs associated with apartment living. For participants who share an apartment, their half of the rent should start around \$500 for 1-bedroom units and \$750 for 2-bedroom units. Families choose whichever attendant care provider they prefer, using a variety of funding mechanisms (Medicaid waiver programs, private pay, etc.).

Cost: AIM

\$500-700 per month for housing

- BiG is blessed to have over 50 active volunteers and has many opportunities for you to get involved





Myths of a Travel Agent

- Travel Agents don't exist anymore
 - Travel Agents do still exist although most work from home and not "brick and mortar" stores. This reduction in overhead saves the client money and is more convenient for clients
- Travel Agents are expensive
 - Not true. Most often suppliers pay Travel Agents a commission and so the service doesn't cost the client. This commission is not extra and usually the price you see online is the same you will get using a Travel Agent.
- Everyone just books their travel online so Travel Agents aren't needed
 - While travel you can book a trip online, it is often the cause of all of the travel
 nightmares you hear about. Once you make the booking and pay for the hotel, airfare,
 etc. there will be no one there to advise you on other aspects of the trip or to help you
 when something does go wrong.


